The Senior Chaplain's Notes

They shall grow not old As we that are left grow old

This year's Remembrance Sunday services and ceremonies had a special significance as we marked the centenary of the Armistice – the one hundredth anniversary of that moment when the guns fell silent on the Western Front, at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month 1918.

The date was marked with appropriate solemnity at each of our four main congregations – Bergen, Oslo, Stavanger and Trondheim – and I'm told that attendances were noticeably higher than in recent years. There is, it would appear, a deep desire to commemorate those whose lives, in world wars and conflicts past and present, have been given and taken away.

In Oslo we were honoured by the attendance – at our morning service – of ambassadors or representatives from several embassies: the UK, the USA, Ireland, South Africa, Canada and (for the first time) Germany.

Then, later in the afternoon, a large crowd gathered at the city's *Vestre Gravlund* for a wreath-laying ceremony at the Commonwealth War Graves plot. Buried in that place are the mortal remains of 101 World War II servicemen – mostly British – alongside one Norwegian soldier, eight Canadian airmen and one Australian airman. In my words at the ceremony I sought to go behind the statistics and speak of the human lives cut so tragically short.

'Behind me here in the second row, four from the end, is the grave of Able Seaman Robert Evans of the Royal Navy. Robert was just 21 years old when he was killed – a devastating loss to his parents Ralph and Rose Evans back home in Brixton in London.

'Or here, just in front of Robert, in the front row, is the grave of Warrant Officer Hugh Kilday, of the Royal Australian Air Force. Hugh was 31 when he lost his life. And so here he is, laid to rest in Oslo, some 9000 miles away from his home town – the little town of Yarragon, in the state of Victoria, Australia.

'So, today we remember Robert. And today we remember Hugh. And today we remember all those who lost their lives in the two devastating wars of the twentieth century. Indeed, we remember today all those who made the ultimate sacrifice in the cause of freedom and peace.

'And today we also rededicate. We rededicate ourselves to the ongoing task of defending freedom – the ongoing task of building peace. We dedicate ourselves to being, in our time, instruments of reconciliation and peace. We dedicate ourselves, in the words of the prophet Isaiah, to "beating our swords into ploughshares and our spears into pruning hooks."

'Remember and rededicate. That is perhaps the greatest tribute we can pay this day to Robert and to Hugh. That's the greatest tribute we can pay to all those who "for our tomorrow gave their today."

We will hold a service of Nine Lessons and Carols in *Korskirken* on 15 December (at 15:00) and in *Mariakirken* on 16 December (at 18:00) with a reception and raffle to follow in *Mariastuen*. These two carol services continue to be highly anticipated by the Bergen community and serve as an important means for us to profile our congregation and hopefully attract new members. Our Christingle service will come a little later in the season of Advent this year on the Fourth Sunday of Advent and we will hold, as usual, a Christmas Day service in Mariakirken. Wishing you all a wonderful Christmas season and every blessing in 2019!

Trondheim notes

I've become convinced that we really must try to find a better word to describe the period of time between the departure of one priest from a parish and the arrival of his or her successor. The words typically employed – 'vacancy' or 'interregnum' – really won't do. To say that a parish is vacant, for example, is to suggest that it is somehow empty or deserted – ignoring the fact that the 99.9 per cent of the faithful who are not ordained are – by the grace of God – still going about their daily lives of prayer and service.

And the other word – interregnum (literally 'between reigns') – is, if anything, even worse! It suggests that the priest is some sort of monarch and that all activity ceases when there is no-one on the throne! I can assure you that is far from the case for our Trondheim congregation, who continue to pull together to ensure that the work of ministry and mission continues while we discern the way forward and seek a new assistant chaplain.

So, I want to pay tribute to everyone involved in Trondheim – the Assistant Warden, the Licensed Readers, the members of the Congregational Committee, and all who give of their time, talents or treasure to ensure continuity of worship and pastoral care. It is a real joy to see their commitment and enthusiasm. In fact, these qualities are particularly in evidence at the moment as we face into the busy seasons of Advent and Christmas.

At the time of writing, final preparations are being made for the annual Christmas Sale, to be held on Saturday 24 November from 13:00 to 16:00 at *Waisenhuset* (Kongsgårdsgate 2). As always there will be lots of mince pies, Scottish shortbread, Christmas cakes, chutneys, jams and other goodies to purchase as well as Advent calendars, ornaments and English language Christmas cards for sale. Then in December there will be the ever-popular Christingle Service on Sunday 9 December at 11.00, and a large crowd is expected again this year for the

Service of Nine Lessons and Carols at Nidaros Cathedral on Tuesday 18 December at 18:00. Plans are also in hand for early 2019, with a Book Café scheduled for Saturday 2 February and a Lenten Study Group, beginning in March. Further details will be announced in due course.

Finally, at this time of discernment and transition, please keep all those involved in planning for the future of the Trondheim Congregation in your prayers. In the life of faith there are, of course, different seasons – ‘a time for everything under heaven’ as the writer of Ecclesiastes reminds us. However, through it all, God is still God – there is no ‘interregnum’ or ‘vacancy’ in God’s loving care for us – it is the same yesterday, today and always.

Oslo notes

O come, O come Emmanuel, And ransom captive Israel.

These words from my favourite hymn capture the changing liturgical mood as we leave behind the long season of ‘Sundays after Trinity’ and turn towards the new church year, which begins on Advent Sunday (2 December this year). And while the Christmas season may be in full and hectic swing in the consumerist world around us; we – as Christians – are called to move to a different rhythm of attentive watchfulness and hopeful anticipation.

To help us with this we are organising an Advent Book Group. Following on from the popularity of our Lenten Book Group earlier in the year, this group will meet after church (and church coffee) on the four Sundays in Advent (2, 9, 16 and 23 December). Our reading material will be *Advent for Everyone: A Journey through Luke* by Tom Wright.

In this book the former Bishop of Durham, a noted biblical scholar, explores the Gospel themes of encouragement, renewal, justice and celebration. Within each of these themes, Wright offers daily readings and meditations for a week, beginning with the Sunday reading in the Revised Common Lectionary, and ending with stimulating questions for personal reflection and/or group discussion.

Please do consider joining this Advent Book Group for any or all of the sessions. I have a limited number of copies of the book to give to

those who are interested. They can also be purchased online.

At the time of writing these notes, we have just had a very successful and enjoyable Christmas Bazaar at the Swedish Church. Many thanks to all who worked so hard to make this year’s event such a success – and thanks too to our good friends at the Swedish Church for allowing us to use their beautiful premises.



The Nordic and Baltic Deanery Synod Reykjavik, September 2018

The annual Deanery Synod for 2018 was held in Reykjavik, Iceland, from 13 to 16 September, and hosted by the Revd Bjarni Þór Bjarnason, who is vicar of Seltjarnarnes Parish and was licensed during the Synod as Anglican Priest-in-Charge of the Anglican Congregation in Iceland. It was well attended by clergy and lay delegates from most chaplaincies. All Norwegian congregations were represented, as well as those from Denmark, Sweden, Finland, and Latvia. The synod was opened by the Area Dean, Revd Nick Howe.

The theme for this year's Synod concerned climate change and was discussed from a theological angle. On Friday afternoon a lecture was given by Professor Sólveig Anna Bóasdóttir of the Faculty of Theology and Religious Studies at the University of Iceland. She described how human life thrived on Earth for 10,000 years, but that since the Industrial Revolution earth's cycle has changed. She considers climate now to be the greatest challenge mankind has ever faced. Although the poor are the first to be impacted by these changes, she emphasised that 'loving our neighbour' should not only apply to humans but to all life, and we have a moral duty to work to preserve it in all its diversity. All churches and faiths need to contribute to this protection. Later we were invited to a reception and buffet hosted by the Bishop of Iceland, Agnes M. Sigurðardóttir, at her residence.

Services were held each day in the Cathedral Church of Reykjavik, including a wonderful Eucharist with the choir on Sunday morning with the licensing of Revd Bjarnason. On Saturday a challenging Bible Study was led by the Revd Jana Jeruma-Grinberga, Chaplain of St Saviour's, Riga, based on Micah 6 6-8 and the parable of the wages for the workers in the vineyard from Matthew 20 1-16.

This was followed by the Lay Chapter Meeting where new regulations for the protection of personal data were presented and discussed (the EU's General Data Protection Regulation). The rules cover a myriad of everyday aspects like tax details, webpages, donations, lists of people, spreadsheets and photographs. What data do we have, and how do we handle them?

Adequate protection is necessary but difficult and time-consuming. All the chaplaincies are struggling to achieve control, but there are numerous straightforward means to limit how information is used, and who should have access to it. A safeguarding update was presented by Susan Boyd who also answered questions. Costs have risen sharply in recent years, but are at last beginning to plateau. Courses and implementation of safeguards are now widespread.

Considerable discussion was given to the diocesan Common Fund. A proposal had been made to increase donations from chaplaincies to 10% to cover costs for new archdeacon positions, consultancy on communications, the Mission Opportunities Fund, and safeguarding. Both Clergy and Lay Chapter were independently in agreement that such a move would quickly bankrupt numerous congregations. At the subsequent Business Meeting (where both clergy and laity meet), it was agreed that the overall financial situation in the chaplaincies should be resolved first, and the suggestion to the Diocese was that we were only prepared to strengthen safeguarding at this time. There was also a motion to change rules allowing members in the Diocese of Europe to attend Church Council meetings via Skype, as congregations can be spread over a large geographical area (as in Norway). This would allow better representation without the necessity for expensive travel, and allow participation without increasing the carbon footprint. Additionally, Nigel Rowley, Diocesan Rep. and lay chair for many years, and Archdeacon Colin Williams, who retires next March, were thanked for all their contributions to the Deanery.

On Saturday afternoon the Synod was treated to a short excursion to Þingvellir, the ancient seat of the Icelandic Parliament, and also a site where the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates meet. Dr Páll Einarsson, Professor of Geophysics, was our guide at this fascinating place. We delegates were most grateful for the exceptional organisation and hospitality shown by the Revd Bjarnason throughout the Synod.


